I'm here to tell you that the pool is opening its gates for another summer and there's going to be some positive changes.

To start, when the Manheim Borough announced that it couldn't absorb the costs of the aging pool for another summer, the community asked what could be done to save it for at least one more summer. The answer was that funds were needed to help resurface the main pool. A Go-Fund Me page was quickly set up and after just a week, the page and other outside contributions totaled over \$9,000. With other financial assistance from Aaron's Acres and the Manheim Sertoma Club, the borough agreed to keep the pool open for the summer of 2019. But the feeling was that the community wanted more than just one more summer so a group called Friends of the Manheim Pool was formed in January to see how they could help with this endeavor. The main goal of this committee was to brainstorm some ways to make the pool more enjoyable and draw more folks to this wonderful treasure without having to raise large sums of money. The group has met several times and has planned some fun activities for children of all ages throughout the summer.

There will be weekly games for the kids, special events held at the pool on holidays, a family movie night, night swims, a luau night, special treats throughout the summer, and much, much more. You may have also heard that the concession stand will be back this year and run by a local favorite: The Brickhouse Café! They are super excited to extend their business further into our community through the pool. They will be serving up some old-time favorites like hamburgers, hotdogs, and milkshakes but will also be offering some new and creative fare such as funnel fries, hand-cut fries, walking tacos and iced coffee – what could beat having an iced coffee or a milkshake poolside on a hot day? They are even planning to offer snacks to passers-by through a service window in the front of the building for those who are not patrons of the pool.

Community pools are closing all around us and we want to do everything we can to make sure Manheim isn't one of them. If you enjoy the pool and want it to be around for years to come, please consider purchasing a pool pass. Simply visit the borough's website or contact the Lititz Rec Center directly to purchase one. 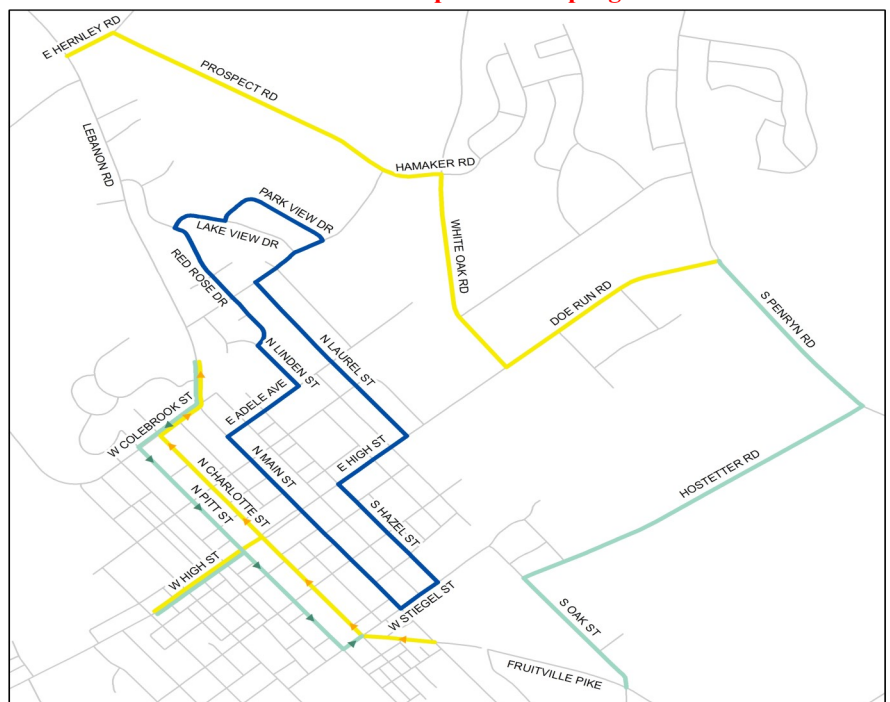

Recycling Bins

Recycling Bins are available at the Borough Office for \$6.00. However, you can now use your own plastic container up to 32 gallons for recycling. Stop by the Borough Office today and pick up 2 **Free** Large Recycling Decals to put on each side of your container so our Recycling Drivers can easily spot your recycling.

Cardboard Dumpsters

Four corrugated cardboard dumpsters are located at the Logan Park Parking Lot off of West Ferdinand Street.

VFW Auxiliary Magazine Dumpster

The Dumpster is located in the Logan Park Parking Lot off of West Ferdinand Street. All money raised from this recycling project is used for the Ronald McDonald House in Hershey.

Battery Bags

Regular household batteries are not to be thrown in the

trash. Orange Battery Collection Bags are available at the Borough Office at no charge. Fill the bag, seal it and place it next to your recycling container. The trash hauler will collect the bag during regular trash/recycling days. This does not include auto and utility vehicle batteries, which should also not be placed in your trash.

Large Appliance & Tire Pick-ups

Large Appliance & Tire pick-up is scheduled for Thursday, April 25th. A large appliance, or white good, is an appliance with a motor, engine, or compressor. For disposal of your appliance please be sure to purchase a \$15.00 Large Appliance Tag from the Borough Office. Tires must display a \$3.00 tire tag, also available for purchase at the Borough Office. The Fall Pick-up will be Thursday, October 25th. **Orange Oversize item tags are also available at the office for \$5.00 and 2 items a week can be put out on any regular trash day.**

Woody Yard Waste Pick-up

WYW Days (on regular trash days) All Green Tags are still purchased at the Borough Office and the Library for \$1.50. **APRIL 18TH FREE NO TAG DAY ONLY WITH TAG DAYS will be May 2, 16 & 31, June 13 & 27, July 11 & 25, August 8 & 22, September 6 & 19 and October 3, 17 & 31.**

Reminder

Trash and recycling is not to be placed curbside before 6:00 PM the evening before your pick-up day. If your trash or recycling is missed, please contact the Borough Office immediately.

Since January 2013, Covered Devices (televisions, computers, monitors etc.) are no longer collected curbside. The County offers free disposal of household hazardous waste.

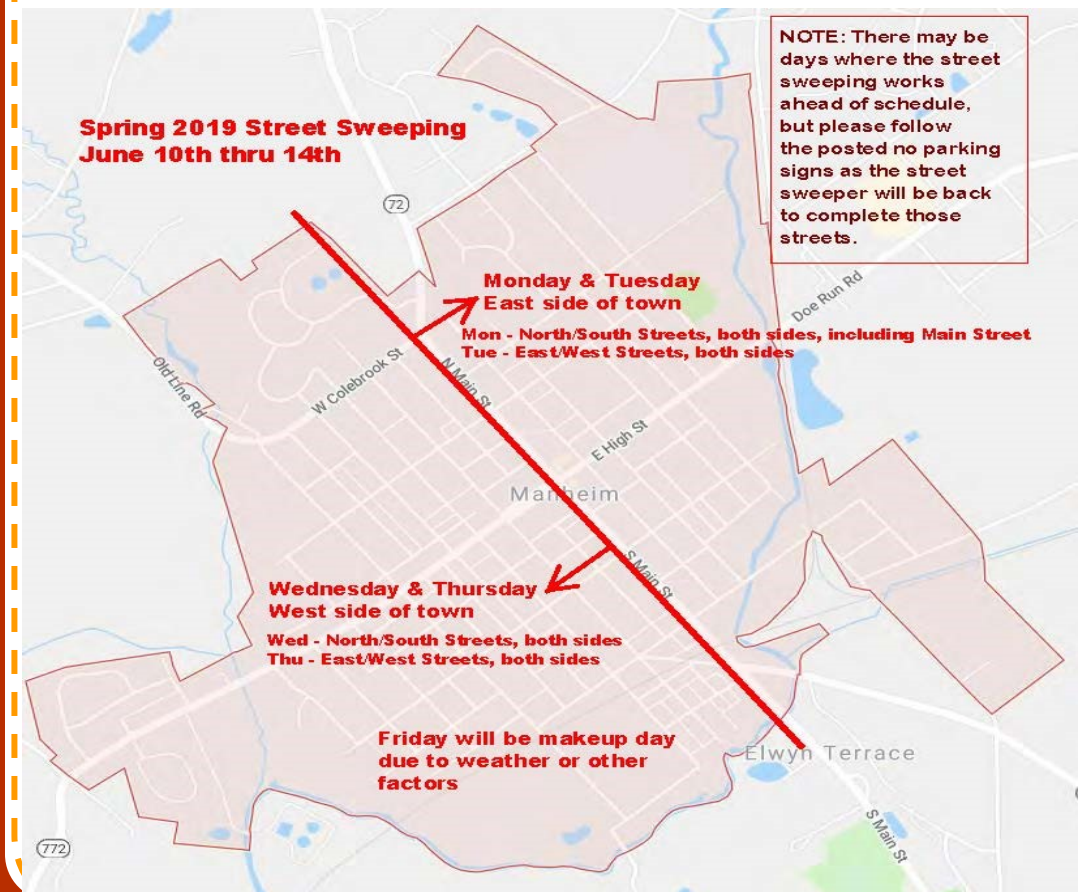

West High Street Paving Project: This PennDOT project, originally scheduled for completion in 2018, was postponed until this year. The project is tentatively scheduled to begin in May, upon completion of the UGI work on Market Square.

North Linden Street Reconstruction Project: This project, extending from East High to Gramby, adjacent to the new Baron Elementary School, will involve full-depth reclamation which will reconstruct the entire street.

South Hazel Street Reconstruction/Repaving Project: This project, extending from High to Stiegel, will include full-depth reclamation between Ferdinand and Stiegel which will reconstruct the entire street. The existing storm drain that goes from Hazel through Swan Park to the Chiques Creek will be replaced and reoriented to allow for better discharge capacity in order to reduce the street flooding that currently occurs when the Chiques remains within its banks. Between High and Ferdinand, the surface will be milled and repaved as this area currently has a concrete layer under the existing asphalt. Ahead of this project, tentatively in April, UGI will be replacing the gas main between High and Ferdinand. This reconstruction and paving work is tentatively scheduled to occur in late June/early July.

MS4: These innocent-looking two letters and one number represent some very big responsibilities for the Borough. MS4 stands for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, and represents all of the streets, gutters and pipes — basically anything that carries storm water runoff from where it falls and into streams...and eventually into the Chesapeake Bay — that exist in the Borough. As an MS4 municipality, we are responsible for not only the quantity of that water runoff, but also the quality. Rules and regulations have been established by US EPA, passed down to the PA DEP, and, of course, passed further down to us as a local government for ultimate implementation. Be assured that your Borough staff is working hard to maintain compliance with the regulations, and to do so in the most cost-efficient manner possible.



The goals of the Borough's MS4 program are to reduce the discharge of pollutants into our waterways. The water that runs off your property and from the streets goes either into the ground and becomes groundwater or flows through a series of facilities such as swales and pipes to the waterways. If this water isn't cleaned, all the pollutants the water carries end up in the stream and ultimately into the Chesapeake Bay. You can help to keep our water clean by doing the following:

What residents can do...

- Properly dispose of water from your property (rainwater, pool water, sump pumps, etc.) – directing water runoff over grassy areas, and not into streets and gutters, is required whenever this option is possible.
- Do not wash your car in your driveway or in the street.
- Clean up after your pets.
- Use fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides correctly, beginning by using absolute minimum recommended application rates.
- Properly secure and store materials that could pollute storm water. When servicing your vehicle, do not allow oil, antifreeze, or other fluids to spill or drain onto any surface of the ground.

In addition, please monitor the storm water facilities that you see or live near. If you see something that simply looks “wrong” or that is causing these facilities to be polluted or blocked, please call the Borough office at (717) 665-2461.

Examples of Illicit Discharges include:

- Sediment leaving a construction site during a storm or being carried out onto the public road
- Spills (Chemical, Gas, Oil)
- Illegal dumping activity into streams or storm water facilities
- Dry weather flows from outfalls into streams (at least 72 hours after a storm)

Zoning & Code Compliance Information

As we all look forward to the warm breezes of summer, clearing snow and ice gets replaced by mowing and weeding and trimming. So following are some reminders for everyone. Through spring and summer, complaints are investigated and pro-active checks for overgrown grass and/or weeds in your yard, sidewalks and street gutters are performed.

High grass and weeds must be maintained no higher than 6" in height. Trees and bushes must be cut back to allow a minimum clearance of 8 feet above the public sidewalk or 14 feet above a street surface; shrubs growing into the public sidewalk or at corners where they may block the view of on-coming traffic shall be trimmed back as well. Peeling paint, loose gutter systems, wobbly handrails and guards on the front or back porch should all be addressed.

A Public Safety Notice will be personally posted at any property and if non-owner occupied, mailed to the owner as well, when there is evidence of a specific violation of high grass & weeds, an accumulation of garbage, rubbish and/or animal waste or the lack of proper storage of garbage & rubbish.

If a Public Safety Notice is issued for high grass & weeds and the violation is eliminated within 10 days, there is no fine. If the violation is not eliminated within 10 days, a second notice will be issued along with a fine of \$75.00. If the violation is not eliminated within the next 10 days, the fine will be \$150.00, with the fines increasing with further notices. Unpaid fines may result in a citation being issued through the district justice office.



This applies to overgrown grass & weeds in street curbs, sidewalks, parking lots, gardens, between fencing as well as yards. Every tenant/occupant of a property per the Property Maintenance Code "is responsible to keep that part of the exterior property which the tenant/occupant controls in a clean and sanitary condition" and will receive notices and held accountable the same as the property owner.

But, as always, our goal is not to issue citations, notices or fines...we simply want everyone to take proper care of their properties so that Manheim can be a great place to live, work, and visit!
